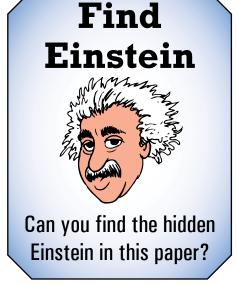

Even the Dead Are Fair Game for certificate to the credit-reporting **Identity Theft**

An article in the AARP Bulletin (Mar. 2013) by Sid Kirchheimer discusses how identity thieves target "2.5 million deceased Americans

fraudulently open credit card accounts, apply for loans and get cellphone or other services. . . . "

This works quite successfully because "it can take 6-months for financial institutions, credit-reporting bureaus and the Social Security Administration to receive, share, or register death records and the dead do not monitor their credit . . . and often, neither do their grieving survivors."

The scammers check obituaries. "With a name, address and birth date, they can illicitly purchase the person's Social Security number on the Internet for as little as \$10."

At this time of year using the deceased identities filing for tax refunds can be surprisingly profitable. These fraudulent returns "totaled \$5.2 billion in 2011."

When preparing an obituary do NOT include "the birthdate, mother's maiden name or other personal identifiers that could be useful to ID thieves. Omitting the person's address... reduces the ing. likelihood of a home burglary during the funeral."

identity theft:

1. Use certified mail with return receipt and send copies of the death agencies: Equifax, Experian, and Transunion; tell them to place a "deceased alert" on the credit re-

- 2. Mail death certificates to banks, insurers, brokerages, credit card companies, and mortgage companies where the deceased held accounts.
- 3. When closing an account, make sure that the institution lists the account "Closed: Account Holder Deceased". For joint accounts, remove the deceased's name."
- 4. To report the death to Social Security, call 1 800-772-1213.
- 5. Notify the Department of Motor Vehicles to cancel the deceased's license.

Finally, after 4-6 weeks, check the credit report at annualcreditreport.com just in case there is any unusual activity.

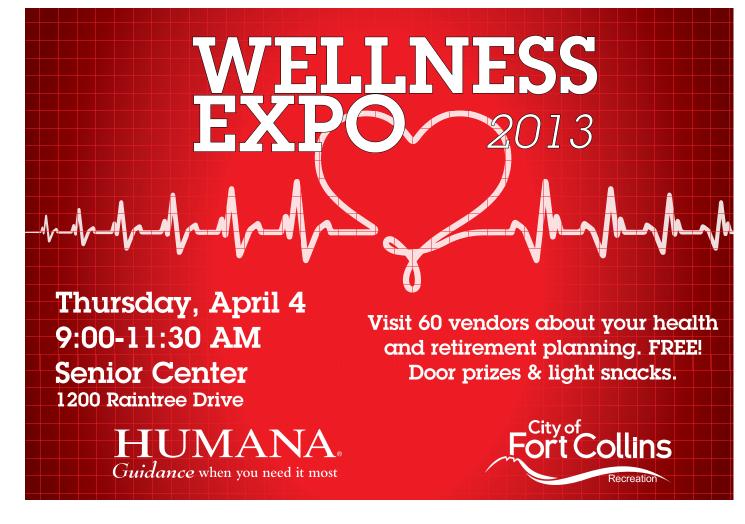

How Healthy Is Your County?

Rates of premature death in counties across the U.S. are the lowest in 20 years, but people in the least healthy counties are more than twice as likely to die early as those in the healthiest counties, according to a new report.

In addition, childhood poverty rates in unhealthy counties are twice as high as those in healthy counties, according to the 2013 County Health Rankings, by Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute.

This is the 4th year of the rankings, which examine 25 factors that influence health: rates of smoking, obesity levels, teen birth rates, access to doctors, child poverty, physical activity, high school graduation rates and percentages of children with a single-parent. Plus, how long people live and how well they feel. The rankings identified significant trends:

- Child poverty rates have not improved since 2000, and one in five children lives in poverty.
- Violent crime has decreased by almost 50% in the last 2 decades.
- Counties where people don't live as long with poor physical & mental health have high rates of smok-

ing, teen births, physical inactivity and preventable hospital stays.

- Teen birth rates are more than twice as high in the least healthy counties.
- People in healthier counties are 1.4 times more likely to have access to a doctor.

The rankings "can be put to use right away by leaders in government, business, health care and individuals motivated to create a culture of health in their community," Dr. Risa Lavizzo-Mourey, president, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, said in a news release. "The rankings are driving innovation, unleashing creativity and inspiring changes to improve health in communities across the country."

Dr. Patrick Remington, associate dean at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine, said no single sector alone can tackle the challenges in any given community. Collaboration is critical. The rankings are sparking action as people from all sectors join forces to create new possibilities in health - county by county."

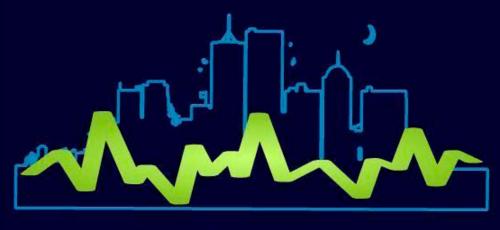

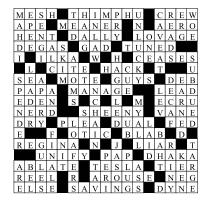
