

Windsor Harvest Festival Set for September 2-4

The Windsor Harvest Festival, entering its 101st year, celebrates the end of summer with numerous events and activities, arts and crafts and commercial vendors, and much more. This year's festival runs Saturday, Sept. 2 from 6 to 9 p.m. at Boardwalk Park, 100 N. 5th St. through Sunday, Sept. 3 and Monday, Sept. 4 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Main Park, 300 Locust St.

The following are some of the events scheduled during this year's Harvest Festival:

The festival kicks off early Saturday and Sunday morning with hot air balloon launches at 6:30 a.m. from Eastman Park, 7025 Eastman Park Dr., weather permitting.

Saturday's events also include the 17th Annual Windsor Cruise-In Car Show from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Also, weather permitting, a fireworks display will hit the sky over Windsor Lake at approximately 9:05 p.m.

Also on Saturday, the Vintage Baseball Game takes place at 11 a.m. at Eastman Park, with an additional scrimmage at 1:30 p.m.

Sunday events also include an Art LIVE! performance with ceramicist Christine Ginnity at Main Park from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Attendees will have the opportunity to engage with Ginnity, a local Windsor artist and watch the creative process of pottery in-person.

Live entertainment, booths, games and more continue through Sunday and Monday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Main Park.

Weld Area Agency on Aging **Colorado Mission Of Mercy** Free Dental Clinic September 22 & 23, 2023



Mission of Mercy (COMOM) is a portable, large-scale dental clinic that is held annually in a Colorado community. The mission of

COMOM is to provide quality dental services, at no cost, to individuals of all ages who cannot afford and access dental care, eliminating dental pain, promoting oral health, creating smiles, and providing oral health education.

The 16th annual COMOM dental clinic will be held on Friday, September 22, and Saturday, September 23, 2023, in Greeley at the Island Grove Regional Park. Doors open at 6:00 am and will remain open until the clinic is at full capacity.

Patients will undergo health and dental evaluation, and will be provided with cleanings, fillings, root canals and extractions. COMOM dentists and dental lab techs will also prepare ceramic crowns, dentures, and flippers. An outpouring of nearly 200 volunteer dentists from across the state - along with hundreds of dental hygienists, assistants, lab technicians,


The Colorado and a myriad of lay volunteers and other health professionals - will work in tandem with community groups and agencies to better the oral health of individuals who were in need. Dental treatment will be provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Flu shots are offered to patients and to family and friends who are with patients.

> COMOM is not able to provide patients with extractions of wisdom teeth, tooth implants, nor root canal treatment of molars. Patients on blood thinners or osteoporosis medications will not have extractions. At the dental clinic, blood pressure testing will be performed on all patients, and glucose testing will be performed on patients who have a history of diabetes. Patients with blood pressure or glucose levels that are too high, cannot be treated at COMOM.

> COMOM is a "no-questionsasked" clinic, and all individuals are welcomed to receive care. On average, COMOM dentists see 1,200 patients. Since 2007, CO-MOM has served 18,000 patients and provided \$16,000,000 in donated dental care.

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

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



Elder Law Q & A Unwitnessed Will Ruled to Be Valid



Appellate Court holds that an unwitnessed will can be probated because extrinsic document suggest the testator

intended to create a will.

Melanie Berger was engaged to the time of signing. Maria Coronado. Before undergoing major surgery, Ms. Berger wrote a letter purporting to be a will, leaving everything for Ms. Coronado. Although Ms. Berger signed the letter, there were no witnesses. She emailed her fiancée to inform her about her intent to leave everything to her and said she would place the document on her chair.

The relationship ended, and a marriage never occurred. Ms. Berger became religious and expressed wanting to leave her estate to the church prior to her passing but did not create a known will. When the pastor of Melanie's church went through her personal effects, he discovered the letter at the bottom of one of her desk drawers.

Ms. Coronado attempted to probate the letter as a valid will,

The California and Ms. Berger's surviving sister opposed it. The trial court denied Ms. Coronado's petition to probate the proposed will, and she appealed.

> In this case, substantial evidence, including the words of the letter and external evidence, suggest that Ms. Berger intended to create a will. The letter is comprehensive, naming Ms. Coronado as the sole beneficiary and giving her full discretion over the estate. Ms. Berger used her company paper and included her Social Security number. Treating the letter like a will, she gave Ms. Coronado a copy and retained a copy for herself.

> The court held the evidence and contents of the document establish a valid will.


